For 30 years Bonnie traveled the world teaching Creative Quilting Techniques. It was exciting, but as her passion for quilting faded she found herself drawn to Glamour Photography. She wanted to show women that they were beautiful. It didn't matter how old they were, much how thev weighed, how tall they were, etc. To Bonnie, they were all beautiful within. It became her desire with each job to pose, compose with light and click the camera so that she captured that beauty.

But Bonnie also loved creating art too. "After all I had been doing it for a long time in my quilting" she says. Com-

posite photography was a natural progression from those initial glamour shots. "I

love taking parts and pieces of lots of different photos to create a Magical Fantasy Photo. The best part of composite work is that I can totally place my model within a magical world

which then becomes a wonderful family heirloom to be handed down thru the family". This month Bonnie will share

with us the techniques for using textures and layering which have become a part of her composite work. If you've ever looked at one

of your pictures and thought, "I wish I could do something more with this but I don't know how", then this presentation will give you the tools and inspiration to try!

Executive Committee Meeting Notes-September 4, 2018

In attendance: Ray Roper, Dick Ludwig, Bill Keenan

This executive committee meeting was the first to take place in the Pullen Room of the Monroe County Library in Stroudsburg. The committee will continue to meet there through the end of the year. Next meeting will be Tuesday, Oct. 2.

Ray Roper announced that he has invited Kay Williams to be PPC's Photographer of the Month on the PPC website. And he has invited Anthony Lorenc to do the Curtain Raiser at the next PPC general meeting on September 18. As of the time of the meeting, he had not gotten a response from either of them.

It was noted that while information on the September general meeting had been posted on the PPC website home page, it had not been posted on the "Meetings" page.

Upcoming shoot-outs for September are still in the planning stage. Susan Field has offered to arrange one focusing on "classic cars" at a location near the Quiet Valley Farm. The tentative date and time would be Sunday, Sept. 15, at 2:00 p.m. Further details will be announced when available.

Ray Roper is also working to set up the next Pocono Heritage Land Trust (PHLT) shoot-out – possibly at Pocono Creek in downtown Tannersville. But the time and date are still uncertain. Ray also notes that the PHLT might like us to these shoot-outs through the course of the year to be able to get a record of the changing seasons.

The RESCUEdog exhibit, which includes a number of PPC member photos, is set to open on September 6, and a reception, including a panel discussion, will be held on Thursday, September 13, from 5-7 p.m. at the Dunning Gallery of the Keystone Building at Northampton Community College, Monroe Campus.

There will also be an exhibit of PPC member photos featuring "Fall Colors" in the Payette Room of the Shawnee Inn for the month of October. Hanging will be on Oct. 5, and there will be a reception on Sunday, Oct. 7, from 3-5 p.m. Members can exhibit up to three photos per person for \$10. Pick-up will take place on Oct. 29 and 30.

The speaker for the next PPC general meeting will be Bonnie McCaffery who will be speaking on "Textures, Overlays, and More for Photographers." Ray Roper indicated that Ms. McCaffrey had contacted him to be sure that there would be a projector and a table for her at the meeting, and he assured her that there would be.

The committee also noted a lack of traffic at the PPC booth at the Garlic Fest at Shawnee Mt. over Labor Day Weekend. It might have been due to a disadvantageous booth location. The executive committee will discuss whether to continue with this commitment in the future.
