

Executive Committee Meeting Notes

PPC Executive Committee Meeting Notes - 1-2-19

In attendance: Ray Roper, Eric Goins, Dick Ludwig, Bob Hare, Bill Keenan

Dick Ludwig said that he is still looking for some addition photos to consider for February's "What Would You Do?" presentation. And he hopes to have enough by the January general meeting. He's looking for images that members can enhance, add to, or take some interesting post-processing approaches to.

Bob Hare, PPC's new webmaster, will be looking for ways to make the PPC website easier to navigate, both for members and for non-members, by streamlining our menu system and other measures. The committee also discussed putting a time limit on photographic equipment being offered for sale on the PPC website.

The committee also discussed how the January general meeting on "Hidden Pho-tential" would be presented. Right now we have five experienced members who will set up stations where members can bring up to three photos for advice on how they might be improved via post-processing. Those stations will be manned by Ray Roper, Sarina Cook, Dick Ludwig, Ann LeFevre, and Bob Hare. We might also do a basic presentation for the group on the "ABC's of Post-Processing."

Ray Roper indicated that he has asked Nancy Spencer to be the next Photographer of the Month, but hasn't heard back from her yet. We'll update this on the website if necessary. We also discussed how we can solicit more interest from members to participate in both the Photographer of the month and Curtain Raiser offerings.

We also discussed ways in which we can generate publicity for our general meetings both via emails to members and via the PPC website blog. We also talked about using the blog to offer basic advice on some photographic and post-processing techniques.

Ann LeFevre will be coordinating the next Scavenger Hunt, in conjunction with the Palmerton Photo Club. We will probably go with a shorter time frame this year than in years past. More details will be announced shortly.

A new date for the Smithfield Photo Exhibit is still undetermined. We will post that as soon as it is available.

The committee also discussed some potential shoot-outs for January. Ray Roper has been in touch with the Pocono Heritage Land Trust (PHLT) about sites to do some winter photos at the end of January. A number of other winter photography options are being considered. Details will be posted as soon as they are available.

We also discussed encouraging PPC members to participate in the Pennsylvania Center for Photography's current "Odyssey" competition. PCP is looking for photos that evoke a journey and can include photos taken at any time, anywhere in the world. The call for submissions ends on February 18, and the exhibit will run from March 22 to April 19. Details are available at the Pennsylvania Center for Photography's website at www.pacenterforphotography.org. And a link will soon be posted on the PPC website.
