


## April's Meeting is Going to the Extreme!

#### PPC Executive Committee Meeting Notes – 3/5/19

It was reported that the schedule of general meeting presentations for the balance of 2019 is now complete, including:

March - Jeannie Carl, on tabletop items.

April - Bradley Teets, on macro-photography.

May - Ray Hennessey, on bird photography.

June - Scavenger Hunt results with judge Peter Gorniak.

July - Richard Lewis, on his Pine Barrens photos.

August - Aric Groban, on portrait lighting.

September - Chris Karfarkis, on the history of photography.

October - Padma Inguva, on flower photography.

November - Dave Butler, on a Christmas Wish List

December - Photo-share and social.

Treasurer Dick Ludwig noted here that club finances looked good, even with the full slate of speakers, so the club might look for someone who can give a workshop for members on a non-meeting night between now and the end of the year.

PPC president Ray Roper will be traveling over the next few weeks and will not be available to preside over the next PPC general meeting (3/19) and the next Executive Committee Meeting (4/2). Ann LeFevre will be filling in for him on both of those occasions.

In place of the curtain-raiser and Photographer of the Month for the next general meeting we will be displaying instead the photographs contributed to last month's "What Would You Do?" competition. The March presentation of table-top items will also require us to bring in several light-tables and light-boxes for display purposes, and these will be set up in the room next door to our usual meeting room in the Keystone Building a NCC-Monroe.

Ray Roper will be back again for the April general meeting (4/16). Bob Cook will be the Photographer of the Month for April. Ann LeFevre is currently recruiting someone to provide a curtain-raiser.

The Middle Smithfield Exhibit is coming up at the Whispering Pines Banquet Hall in the Country Club of the Poconos, from March 30 through April 29, and members will be encouraged to participate. Drop-off dates are March 25 -29, and hanging will take place on March 29. Reception will be on March 31. Pick-up is scheduled for April 29 through May 3.

Ann LeFevre discussed the tentative rules for this year's Scavenger Hunt, held in conjunction with the Palmerton Photo Club. There will be 8 categories, and participants will have 6 weeks to shoot and prepare their photos. Traditional post-processing work, such as cropping, saturation, and exposure, will be allowed, but no composites, plug-ins, texturing, or layering will be allowed. Subjects have yet to be announced. Details will be announced on the PPC website as soon as they are available.

Our annual exhibit at the Smithfield Township Administration Building is still on hold due to repair work being done at the building. We might be able to schedule something for June or July, but that is still undetermined.

The March Shoot-Out at ESU's Schisler Museum will be on either March 16 or March 23. Details will be announced as soon as they are available. We are waiting to hear from the curator as to which date is available. The April Shoot-Out at the Pocono Heritage Land Trust's Cranberry Creek Preserve is still scheduled for April 14, but a specific time has yet to be determined. Details will be announced on the PPC website as soon as they are available. The Club is also looking into the possibility of doing another shoot-out sometime in April.

Ray Roper announced that he and club member Gina Matarazzo have had photos accepted for the Pennsylvania Center for Photography (PCP) Odyssey Exhibition in Doylestown, PA. And Ray and club member Laurinda Faye Rubin have had photos accepted for the Pocono Arts Council's "The Earth Speaks" exhibit in Stroudsburg. Details are available on the PPC website.
