He also has the ability to see what others do not in highlighting the graphic elements that would otherwise go unnoticed.





A "Closer" Look at Landscape Photography by Sarah Marino

In researching an upcoming article, I came across a super-popular post about the "laws of landscape photography." Really? LAWS? At least "rules" and "conventions" conjure up some degree of flexibility, but laws... That word implies a sense of strictness that is in total opposition to the idea of photography as a form of personal expression. These laws, rules, and conventions can be marginally helpful in some ways but also stand in the way of creative expression once a photographer understands the basics of the craft. As one of my recent coaching clients commented, "It is exhausting to spend so much time getting out of the mindset of doing things the "right way".

So let's all stop thinking about the "right ways" to pursue landscape and nature photography. Instead of focusing on rules, we can look inside ourselves and start with what we hope to accomplish with our work, our motivations, the connections we make with the subjects we choose in nature, and how we want to present those connections through our finished photographs. Those ideas should guide our decisions much more than the field's standard practices.

With regard to my own work, the rule that says "never center a composition" comes to mind. Such a rule will save you from yourself by preventing you from creating a boring, static composition, right? No. Instead of starting with this arbitrary rule, how about we start with the goal, feeling, or idea we hope to convey through a photo or body of work, and then make our composition decisions in partnership with our goals?

In my case, one of my major goals is to find order, harmony, and grace in nature and then portray it through my photos. This approach helps ease my busy mind and calm the chaos around me. So, if this approach is a major theme of my work, maybe centered, balanced, and symmetrical composition will actually help me convey the qualities of a scene that resonate with ME.

Sarah Marino is a landscape photographer based in southwestern Colorado whose area of concentration includes grand landscapes, intimate landscapes, abstract renditions of nature, and creative portraits of plants and trees. Sarah's teaching, through in person workshops, ebooks, and video tutorials, focuses on personal expression, seeing opportunities in any landscape, photographing nature's small scenes, and a slow style of photography focused on exploration and connecting with nature. Photos of Court House Square (like this photo) are NOT needed but photos of Main Street, the side streets and anything that would make people want to come and enjoy the downtown area, such as the architecture, would be acceptable. Close-up pictures of people cannot be used but crowd scenes can. Photos of individual store fronts are also discouraged. Seasonal shots are also desired and editing is fine. Pictures should be 300dpi or larger and photographers can submit up to 10 pictures of their best work. Please label your pictures with your name and a number. Example: Joe Photographer 1. Submissions should be sent to <u>mcevanisko@gmail.com</u> with "Brochure Pic Submission" in the subject box. There has been no deadline mentioned as of yet, but the sooner you send your photos in, the better!



September Shoot Out Coming Soon!

Minsi Lake is the largest lake in Northampton County. The 311 acre park surrounding the lake includes extensive woodlands and wetlands and the largest concentration of vernal pools in Pennsylvania. PPC will meet up at the west shore parking lot before heading out on one of two trails. The Lake Trail is about two miles long and runs through the woods around the north side of the lake, connecting the east and west shore parking lots. The Dam Trail is a little over one and a half miles long and travels through the west shore picnic area coming to an end at the spillway at the east end of the dam. Recent restoration work on the dam is making a positive impact on the environment. From wildlife to landscapes there'll be plenty to photograph here. Neither trail is difficult but they could be wet and muddy so dress accordingly. Directions from the Stroudsburg area: take Rt. 191 south to Fox Gap Rd. on the left. Turn left and follow Fox Gap Rd. to Quaker Plain Rd. Turn left on to Quaker Plain Rd. (T726), then right on to Blue Mountain Dr. (T707). Turn left on to Lake Minsi Dr. (T797). GPS coordinates: Lat. 40.912380, Long. -75.178502.

The committee discussed and took a vote on whether to conduct voting for next year's executive committee via a link to the PPC website or during a live Zoom meeting. A test run by Bob Hare on the PPC website seemed to work successfully, and the committee chose to conduct this year's vote via the PPC website.

The August general meeting with Lisa Langell went well. The feedback on the content of her presentation was positive, and the gap between her presentation and the club's own Zoom follow-up with announcements and photographer of the month went pretty smoothly. The committee agreed that we could do this type of two-part presentation again, if necessary.

The PPC's next virtual shootout is set for Saturday, September 5. The theme is "Point of View," and we are looking for different perspectives of the world around us. Details are available on the PPC website.

The September outdoor shootout will be on Sunday, September 13, at Minsi Lake Park in North Bangor, PA. Details are available on the PPC website.

The outdoor shootout for October will be on Sunday, October 11, at the Pocono Creek Preserve in Tannersville, PA. Details will be available on the PPC website. There will also be another shootout at one of the Pocono Heritage Land Trust (PHLT) sites later in October, to take advantage of the fall colors. Keep an eye on our website for details on that.

There is also a virtual shootout on "fall colors" being planned for October 17, and we might combine or coincide that with our late October outdoor shootout.

The committee also discussed an upcoming presentation on macro photography by Mike Moats. The date we have is Saturday, November 14, at 2:00 p.m. A Zoom link will be sent out to PPC members as soon as it is available.

The winners of calendar photo competition sponsored by the Friends of the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area have not yet been determined. According to the Friends, the results should be determined and announced over the next few weeks. And the calendars should be available by mid to late October.

The committee also discussed a request from Mary Evanisko of the Gamut Art Gallery in Stroudsburg, PA, for help with a new "Downtown Stroudsburg" brochure that she is currently working on. She's looking for architectural and other photos of the downtown area that might be used in the brochure. Details are available on the PPC website.
