

Your Heart Sing?





Our Virtual Shoot Out is going Bi-coastal this month! We are joining The Shutterbug Camera Club of Roseville Califonia for "Main Street in March", a shoot out where each club will capture the comings and goings on the main street in their town. For us that's downtown Stroudsburg or East Stroudsburg. In fact if you were to hop on Interstate 80 from Stroudsburg and drive directly across the USA, you'd end up in Roseville!

Debbie Ferris, one of the members of the Shutterbugs and Ann LeFevre met on line at the 365 Project a yearly photo journal. Debbie was interested in how we ran our online meetings and joined us one evening to listen and learn. The two corresponded via email several times and continued to check out each other's work on the Project until an idea was birthed that maybe the two clubs would enjoy a virtual shoot out together that compared and contrasted the two sides of the country right now. Since everyone has an accessible Main Street that seemed to be the logical choice of subject matter.

Debbie says of her area, "We are in the California Delta region, surrounded by farmland, lots of rice fields, orchards and vineyards. The coast is about 3 hours away to the west and the Sierra Nevada Mountains and Lake Tahoe are also about 3 hours away to the east. We are also very near very near Sutter's Fort and Coloma where the gold was discovered that sparked the 1849 gold rush. The nearest cities are Sacramento (40 minutes) and San Francisco (3 hours)." Like PPC the club is made up of photographers whose abilities range from none to professional. Most members have joined so that they can learn more about their cameras and improve their photographic skills. "We are definitely in Spring here. The Daffodils and Freesia are blooming now and the Nectarine trees and Tulips will start blooming by next week." With the Poconos still covered in snow and ice sculptures decorating Main Street right now, as well as some of our members on display in the Arts Council's storefront window, we thought it would be a fun idea to assign "Main Street" to each club and see what our members came up with! As with all our virtual shoot outs you'll have the whole month to capture pictures of Main Street (Stroudsburg, East Stroudsburg or the Main Street closest to you) but if you'd like to meet up with Ann at Stroud Foto on March 6th at 2 pm for a walk along Main Street Stroudsburg to take in the sites and snap some pictures, you're welcome to do so! Shoot In Review ~ Jump Start Your Creativity

Almost 30" of snow and cold weather drove us indoors for our Shoot Out in February– hence the title "Shoot In". We held our first PPC video chat and for the small group that attended it was a lot of fun and sparked our desire to pick up the camera more. Here's a brief summary of Ann's presentation for those of you who'd like to see the "still" version.

It happens to all of us at least once- that time when our creativity runs out and we feel uninspired. Those are the times when our cameras feel like they weigh a thousand pounds and our brains seem like they are stuffed with cotton. There are many ways to combat a slump. Here are three suggestions to help you the next time you come up against that photographic brick wall.



The 30 second game: Pick a room in your home at random. With camera in hand, walk into the room. Select a subject (perhaps the first thing you see) and start shooting. Don't "think" about it; just do it. Make it quick and no longer than 30 seconds. The idea here is to be loose. Creativity can be blocked by over-thinking about the "next shot". This little game helps to bring back some spontaneity into your picture taking.





Take Another Look: We often get used to seeing things the way we always see them. In this exercise the object is to take something common and to look at it from a different perspective. Look at it from all different angles and take a shot from each one. Look up. Look down. Look all around, taking pictures as you go. Looking at a common object from a new vantage point can loosen up the creativity block.





Play with Processing: Upload one of those "Why did I even take this picture?" photos into your photo processing program and play around with the special effects. Go all out and experiment. Don't worry about whether or not you'll actually keep the picture when you've finished, or the time you spend playing around on it. Laugh at what you create. Laughter loosens up your creativity. And who knows? One of those crazy effects may trigger an idea! Processing can also transform an ordinary picture into something that is visually pleasing. Playing with the way a photo looks is a great way to charge up your creativity.



Shooting slumps occur because we become anchored to routine or distracted by our busy lives. Jump starts serve to break those habits and change our perspective. Try one out the next time you're in a rut and see what happens! Looking for further inspiration? Try one of these websites or join an on-line group that offers weekly assignments to spur on your creativity and improve your photography.

Executive Committee Meeting Notes ~ March 2, 2021

Ann LeFevre noted that drop-off for the Pocono Arts Council photo exhibit featuring the Pocono Photo Club was on Monday, 3/1, but six club members missed the drop off. The photos have been hung and the exhibit will go on as scheduled,

Ann also announced that she would be undergoing a surgical procedure on March 15 and would not be running the PPC general meeting on March 16. Carrie Strohl will run the meeting and provide club announcements in her place.

The executive committee also discussed the dates for the upcoming Scavenger Hunt competition and presentation. Connie Reinhart, who is a member of both PPC and the Palmerton photo club joined in this conversation.

The competition will begin on April 1 and extend to June 4. One issue is that the Palmerton Photo Club will announce the results of the competition at their June meeting and the PPC will be doing so at its July meeting. The committee also wondered if the judge that has been selected would be willing to do two presentations on the winners, and who should pay for each. It was decided that PPC will pay for the judging and the presentation at the PPC meeting in July, but that Palmerton would have to pay the fee for a presentation in June. Eric Goins will be talking to the judge to see what he will be willing to accept in terms of payment and how much time he is likely to need for the judging process.

The award options that we will ask the judge to consider include:

Best in category

Best in show

Best group of eight photos

Plus any honorable mentions

Additional details will be worked out and announced on the PPC website as we go forward.

Ann has set up an East Coast-West Coast virtual shootout for March in conjunction with the Shutterbug Camera Club of Roseville, CA. Members can offer photos of their nearest Main Street – and since the Shutterbug club is on the West Coast the differences should be interesting when we view them at the end of the month. Ann is also putting together an outdoor shoot-out on the same theme scheduled for March 6. Members can meet at Stroud Foto on Main Street at 2 p.m. to get some photos.

Sam Prynda is also working on setting up a photo shoot for April at the Cresco Train Station. Details will be announced as they become available.

The club is also planning an online "shoot-in" on March 10 with Terry Flatt offering tips on backyard bird photography along with a photo-share opportunity for members. The specific time will be announced shortly on the PPC website.
