Jim LaSala was born


in Flemington, New Jersey. He specializes in documentary and Fine Art photography reproducing his images on Moab fine art paper as one of their Master Photographers.



My interest in photography began at age 8 or 9 when I was given a Kodak Brownie camera for Christmas. I took a great deal of Black and White photos in the late 1950's and early My interest in photography grew during the late 1960's and into the 1970's. I used several Minolta 35mm SLR's including the SRT 101 and the Minolta XK. I focused on 35mm color slides, home processing thousands of Ektachrome slides using E-4 chemistry. Many decades later, when I retired in 2015, I purchased an Olympus camera and began taking photos once again. Today I use the Olympus OM-D E-M5 Mark III camera with a few common lenses including a macro lens as well as the standard 14-150 Kit Lens. I enjoy taking photos of landscapes, flowers and people, mostly my grandchildren. I enjoy being a member of the Pocono Photo Club because the people I've met here are friendly and helpful. I find the photography of other members to be inspired and inspiring and I've learned a lot from everyone. I look forward to future photo shoot-out opportunities where I can find both old and new locations to photograph, while enjoying the company, and guidance, of fellow club members.





A Word (or two!) from Your President

Several of you have approached me recently and asked when we will be returning to physical meetings. I wish I had a definitive answer for you but the truth is I don't know. Several factors come into play when resuming our monthly meetings in person. First is the actual location. At this point in time the Executive Committee is uncertain as to when and if Northampton Community College will re-open. We are assuming they will open in the Fall but we have not had any official confirmation on that as of yet. And if and when NCC does open up, we are uncertain as to whether or not things will be returning to the same set-up as we had in 2020 prior to Covid 19 shutting everything down. Will non-profit organizations such as ours be able to use rooms? Will we have to "clean-up" afterwards and if so, how extensively? Secondly, protocols and requirements change frequently. It is hard to get a clear cut assessment of what regulations we will be facing when and if we resume as well. So at this point the Executive Committee has determined it's best to keep our monthly meetings virtual. However, if you're craving human contact and the camaraderie all photographers share, take advantage of our Shoot Outs. They're fun, usually outdoors, and there's plenty of time to interact at them.

Most importantly Shoot Outs are an opportunity to build community- within and without. This is particularly true of our involvement with East Stroudsburg's 150th Anniversary celebration. We've had a lower than expected turn out for some of the Eburg Shoot Outs so far. But for those of us who've showed up, it's been a good experience to lend our support. Member Nancy Spencer observed, "I think East Stroudsburg is trying their best in a time where "community" and "positive social" attitudes are lacking. They are trying to get the word out but when most in the ES area are people that did not grow up here the support for "town spirit" is weak. Many do not read the Pocono Record or listen to the local radio station. We are in a sad time where community involvement is low unless we are protesting for some reason. I feel it is important to keep involved with these types of things and support any and all groups that are attempting to promote a positive outcome. The few people I spoke to on the streets that day were not even aware of the day's events or the celebration. We live in a speeding society that is moving so fast that they are forgetting about the past and even more sadly, oblivious to the here and now. I felt bad for the promoters of the Ice Cream Social that they did not have a great outcome, but one very hot Saturday afternoon should not be a deterrent for our group. I was happy that I went. It gave me the opportunity to get some "People" shots."

It's nice that PPC is gaining some community recognition and that we have a positive attitude towards community events. Let's keep that positive view people have of us going by building community together inside our monthly meeting and Shoot Outs and outside by contributing a little bit of our time for someone else's good. I'll see you at the next Shoot Out!



Our Virtual Shoot Outs are Returning!

Isn't it great that venues are opening up and more and more things are returning to a sense of normal? It really makes you want to grab your camera and go! But didn't we have fun with those virtual Shoot Outs while we were housebound? We took a short hiatus from them when Ann landed in the hospital with Covid. But now that summer's here and she's feeling fine, we've decided to bring them back with the hopes you'll be able to capture something for this theme whether you're outside enjoying the sun or indoors staying cool by the air conditioner. It'll also give you a chance to try out a new skill if you've never worked with this kind of lighting before. Once you've taken your shots, email 3 to 5 pictures to Ann at Olivetreeann@mail.com for August's newsletter and slide show. The July Virtual Shoot Out theme is: High Key Lighting. You can choose the subject (s), date (s) and time and location. Send your shots in by Monday, July 26th. Ann will also select one shot out of all the High Key shots as our "Shooting Star" in August. We look forward to seeing what pictures you come up with.

What is High Key Lighting?

High Key is a term to describe images that are bright and contain little to no shadow. The term comes from the early days of broadcast television when scenes with higher contrast were not reproduced well. To make a scene that was easier to properly show on screen, the ratio between the key and fill lights was minimized. It is also sometimes used to describe photos and the photographic style that is simply bright, often with an overexposed background.

In photography today, a high-key image is one that is almost entirely very bright with very little or no dark shadows present. This is usually a creative decision made by the photographer, in order to create a certain mood in the image. A bright, "airy" image most often creates a light, pleasant mood, as opposed to a dark, shadowy image which most often creates a dramatic, romantic, or even scary mood. A good photographer knows how to use not just lighting, but also pose and composition and other elements to create an impactful high-key photograph. It may sometimes be as easy as over-exposing an existing scene by two or three stops, however often a proper high-key image requires careful attention to the balance of light between subject and background, often preserving detail in the subject while nearly or totally blowing out much of the background.

High-key portrait photography can be accomplished using multiple flashes, one for the "key" light, and one for fill light, plus others. Also, high-key images can easily be created using a single light source and other light modifiers such as reflectors or ambient light, to fill a subject's face etc.

The nightmare of Software Updates!!!

If you are like me and use a Mac computer, there are constant updates on OS systems and software, but the question becomes when it is safe to update? We get excited to see what is new, but as you may know, these programs always have issues when first released, and they can cause havoc on your computer. Yikes!

First, I would recommend turning off the auto-update! Make your updates manually when you are ready. A fellow photographer, (Thank You Chris!), forwarded a link to a podcaster, PhotoTaco, that shares information of what has been released, what the issues are, and when it is safe to update. They have a lot of other helpful information on their site. Take a look!

The winning photos will be displayed at the ARTery Gallery in Milford, PA., beginning with an artist's reception on November 13th. Photographers are invited to submit no more than two photos to the contest. Entrants must agree to the official rules and submit a \$10 entry fee to be eligible. 

Executive Committee Meeting Notes ~ July 7, 2021

PPC Executive Committee Meeting Minutes – 7-7-21

In attendance: Ann LeFevre, Sam Prynda, Bob Hare, Dick Ludwig, Sarina Cook, Eric Goins, Bill Keenan

Plans for the July general meeting on the Scavenger Hunt results are underway. Bob Hare will be contacting speaker/judge, Jim LaSala, to set up how it will run via Zoom. Dick Ludwig will arrange for the \$150 check for payment. And Eric Goins reported that PPC did not have a great showing in this year's Scavenger Hunt. Only 10 PPC members participated, compared to 15 from the Palmerton Photo Club.

Ann announced that she had heard from the Shutterbugs in California, and they would like to do another bi-coastal shoot-out with them. And while some committee members were reluctant to do another one right away, we agreed that we could plan one for the Fall. Eric Goins suggested "A Few of My Favorite Things" as a theme. We'll discuss this further at next month's EC meeting.

Ann noted that the club participation in the East Stroudsburg celebration shoot-outs has been low, but so has the public turnout at these events. Sam Prynda also noted that some of his email notes to members did not seem to get out, and we will try to correct that and make sure that more info about upcoming ES150 events get out going forward. Ann will talk to Dawn Chigazola to coordinate PPC participation in future ES150 events.

Bob Hare will also be sending out a link to members for a drop box where they can download their ES150 photos, and others.

And while PPC wants to continue to engage members in the ES150 events, we also want to provide monthly PPC shoot-out opportunities. The recent shoot-out set up by Sam Prynda at the Cresco Train Station was a great success. Sam will be looking into the possibility of doing a shootout at the Sterling Inn, an old Pocono Resort Hotel in South Sterling, PA. We will also be checking with the Pocono Heritage Land Trust (PHLT) to see if it has any shoot-out locations to suggest in the coming months. Sam says that we have also been invited to participate in a East Stroudsburg 150th vendors event, where we might be able to exhibit and sell member photos, and he will look into that as well.

We also spoke briefly about when the club might be able to get back to in-person meetings and presentations. Carrie Strohl is looking into when Northampton Community College (Monroe Campus) might be willing to let us run our general meetings there. And Ann says we might also consider meeting at the East Stroudsburg Methodist Church, and she will see what that might entail. But that is not something that we will be deciding immediately.

The FDWGNRA have announced the calendar winners- top three: Candace Roper, Sarina Cook and Ray Roper. Others: Gina Matarazzo, Bob Hare, Ann LeFevre, Eric Goins, Sam Prynda, and Maurie Harmon. The top 3 will be spot-lighted in this month's newsletter and all images will be showcased in August.
